# **Career related updates**

- Run through surgery training paused for now in England.
- Potential changes to <u>allocation of foundation</u> positions.
- HEE merging to become NHS England tomorrow came out of the <u>Harnessing digital technologies</u> for workforce development education and training.
- New <u>Educator Workforce strategy</u> published 22<sup>nd</sup> March 2023.
- <u>Medical Doctor Degree</u> apprenticeship approved for delivery however no training provider has yet been assigned

# What is the GMC seeing?

"...the risk of burnout is now the highest it has ever been since we began tracking it in 2018."

- 66% 'always' or 'often' worn out at the end of their working day
- 44% regularly exhausted in the morning at the thought of another day of work, increase of 7% on last year

# What are the GMC seeing?

'The wellbeing of doctors is vital because it is linked to a significant problem with retaining doctors.'

17% of secondary care doctors considering leaving the NHS

# What am I seeing

- 55-60 doctors a year
- Higher levels of stress, burnout, imposter syndrome, unsureness and general mental health related challenges.
- More interest in portfolio or alternative careers
- Of those talking about leaving there is more interest in completely different careers

# How would you approach this?

- I've chosen the wrong specialty.
- I'm not sure I want to be a doctor anymore.
- I don't think I'm a good doctor so maybe I should leave?
- I want to do non-clinical things alongside my training.
- I think I like being a doctor but it is making me sick.

# **Tips for exploring**

- Treat online resources with the suspicion many of them deserve.
- Encourage a quick move from online to talking to people
- Consider online forums like doctors net or LinkedIn
- Use self awareness reflection to help create good questions for talking to people
- Accept testing it out may not always be possible

# **Self-Assessment tools**

- An online priorities check list link can be found in the next slide.
- Card Sorts The <u>Roads to Success</u> pdf contains a medically focused card sort that can be printed out and used. Pg's 15-18 with instructions on use following.
- There are many free personality or trait tests online. <u>16 Personalities</u> is one of the better free MBTI (or Myers Briggs) to consider how trainees like to work with other among other traits.
- The two main medically focused tests that match trainees to specialities based on their answers to a series of questions are:
  - <u>Sci-59</u> there is a fee for using this tool
  - <u>BMA Specialty explorer</u> free to BMA members
- <u>Example careers reflection templates</u> from the Medic Portal while these are written for medical students/pre-entry, the process is the same for reflecting on any medical experience.

## Career Exploration tools: Exploring specialities online

- <u>https://www.healthcareers.nhs.uk/explore-roles/doctors/roles-doctors</u> Very basic starting point to find out about clinical specialities. Contains links to many other interesting and more specific websites.
- <u>https://www.aomrc.org.uk/about-us/academy-members/</u> List of medical colleges which each may have careers related content
- Careers support from medical school careers many universities in the UK offer access to their alumni for 2-3 years post-graduation. Some will have additional content on websites (such as alumni videos and case studies) plus events that trainees can attend.
- <u>https://specialtytraining.hee.nhs.uk/</u> Information focusing on recruitment programmes into specialty training
- <u>https://www.aomrc.org.uk/#</u> The Academy of Medical Royal Colleges hold a repository of publications related to workforce planning and often has reports on specific specialities and what changes can be expected within these in the future.
- <u>BMA and BMJ elearning modules</u> and webinars on career planning and choice. Many hospitals have a subscription to these elearning resources or if the trainee is a member they can access them directly.

# Career Exploration tools: Exploring portfolio careers

- <u>https://medicfootprints.org/alternative-careers-for-doctors-the-ultimate-list/</u> While medic footprints has a focus on alternative careers, many of the non-clinical careers in their ultimate guide are very common elements of portfolio careers also. Each topic contains good links to other relevant websites.
- <u>https://www.healthcareers.nhs.uk/explore-roles/doctors/career-opportunities-doctors/alternative-roles-doctors</u> A more basic list however the downloadable alternative careers for medical students also includes different clinical career options and ideas.
- <u>https://www.nottingham.ac.uk/careers/students/graduatejobs/typesofjobs/medicine/altern</u> <u>ative.aspx</u> - Quite a big list of alternative careers but absolutely not all of them. Could be a useful starting point – some clinical, some not.
- <u>www.prospects.ac.uk</u> Website designed for undergraduate students with info on a wider range of jobs with lots of links to help further exploration.
- Networking is key to explore portfolio careers as there is no one way to develop this. See the next slide for tips.

# Career Exploration tools: Networking and talking to people

- <u>https://www.linkedin.com/home</u> LinkedIn is a professional networking website used by millions and is growing in the users from the medical field. There is a lot of information on how to set up a profile and doctors can perform an alumni search by going to their old university and highlighting the Alumni tab.
- <u>https://www.sermo.com/</u> originally an American online networking site for doctors but expanded now to include rest of the world. Has an interesting range of topic specific discussion forums.
- <u>https://www.doctors.net.uk/</u> UK doctors networking site which allows users to ask open questions on a variety of topics.
