• In certain conditions some foods (and toilet preparations) have characteristics of drugs and the ACBS advises as to the circumstances in which such substances may be regarded as drugs. Prescriptions issued in accordance with the Committee's advice and endorsed 'ACBS' will normally not be investigated.

• General Practitioners are reminded that the ACBS recommends products on the basis that they may be regarded as drugs for the management of specified conditions. Doctors should satisfy themselves that the products can safely be prescribed, that patients are adequately monitored and that, where necessary, expert hospital supervision is available.

Selected List Scheme (SLS)

• Part XVIIIB of the Drug Tariff reproduces Schedule 2 of the NHS (General Medical Services Contracts) (Prescription of Drugs etc.) Regulations 2004 which are drugs that can be prescribed only in certain circumstances. These drugs and devices are only for patients with the stated medical conditions, and not for any other purpose.

• Prescribers must endorse prescriptions for these products 'SLS'. If the 'SLS' endorsement is missing, the prescription should not be dispensed and will not be passed for payment by NHS Prescription Services. Pharmacy staff cannot make the SLS endorsement themselves.

- e.g.Colief[®] Liquid, may only be prescribed for the relief of symptoms of CONFIRMED lactose intolerance by:
- o The presence of reducing substances and/or excessive acid in stools,
- o A low concentration of the corresponding disaccharide enzyme on intestinal biopsy
- o Breath hydrogen test
- o Lactose intolerance test
