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NATIONAL EXAMINING BOARD FOR DENTAL NURSES

OBJECTIVE

TO ADVANCE THE EDUCATION OF DENTAL NURSES FOR THE BENEFIT OF THE PUBLIC.

NEBDN undertakes this duty by:

- setting examinations for Dental Nurses which reflect the needs of patients and the profession;
- publishing syllabuses of study for the examinations set by the Organisation for the benefit of candidates and trainers;
- encouraging eligible candidates to sit for the examinations set by the Organisation;
- issuing Certificates and qualification badges to successful candidates;
- managing quality assurance systems to ensure that the standards of the qualifications are maintained;
- liaising with other bodies to promote the education and qualification of Dental Nurses.

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AWARDING BODY PROFILE

NEBDN Since its inception in 1943 the National Examining Board for Dental Nurses (NEBDN), which is a registered charity managed by a board of trustees, has become the most widely recognised awarding body for dental nurses in the United Kingdom. The Head Office and administrative staff are based in Fleetwood, Lancashire. Panel of The Panel of Examiners is made up of registered dental nurses and dentists who have **Examiners** been gualified for more than four years and demonstrate an active involvement in and commitment to the training and gualification of dental nurses. On appointment examiners are required to undergo a residential induction and training programme before examining. There are currently almost 400 members of the Panel of Examiners with the largest proportion coming from general dental practices. The policy and procedures of the Board, in relation to examinations, are determined by a Qualifications Council of elected members, with representation from the British Association of Dental Nurses, British Dental Association and the Association of Dental Hospitals. The Board also has an educational adviser to ensure the qualifications develop in line with current education and training principles. Individual examinations are the responsibility of Qualifications Committees comprised of Panel members with appropriate knowledge and expertise to set examination papers and moderate and verify results. The National Examining Board for Dental Nurses aims to provide equality of opportunity for all without hindrance because of race, gender, sexual orientation, disability, age or socioeconomic background.

INFORMATION FOR CANDIDATES

Scope of the qualification	The Certificate in Oral Health Education is a qualification suitable for qualified dental nurses who are required to provide oral health advice to patients under the direction of a dentist.
Entry requirements	 In order to undertake the qualification, a dental nurse must: a) be registered with the General Dental Council b) have the support of their employing dentist to act as supervisor and validate the workplace activities for the Record of Experience.

Syllabus	The syllabus for the Certificate in Oral Health Education reflects the theoretical knowledge and practical skills necessary for the provision of health education by a dental nurse in a relevant dental environment. NEBDN continually monitors and reviews the structure of the qualification to ensure that it meets current educational requirements and the needs of the profession.
	The syllabus includes words such as describe, explain, identify or demonstrate which indicate the depth of understanding required and will determine how the assessments for the qualification are carried out.
	The application of knowledge in practical situations and the skills required are assessed through a Record of Experience.
Training	Practical training should be undertaken in the dental environment under the supervision of a dentist and recorded on log sheets in a Record of Experience.
	Theoretical training should be undertaken by attendance on an NEBDN accredited course. The syllabus may be covered using lectures, seminars and practical simulation. Other teaching methods may also be used such as Computer Assisted Learning and Problem Based Learning. The main objective of the course is that, upon completion, dental nurses should be competent to offer dental health information to individuals and small groups.
	It is suggested that a total of 45 hours (including practical experience and theoretical teaching) is normally sufficient to cover the course but this is not prescriptive as the delivery may vary from centre to centre.

INFORMATION FOR CANDIDATES

Candidates are required to record their clinical experience, although some of this may be limited by the nature of the environment in which they work. Theoretical instruction in **all** methods of oral health is essential. It is also desirable that as broad a range of practical experience as possible is obtained, as an understanding of a variety of dental health messages will be required for the written examination. Dental practices and course organisers are therefore required to make local arrangements to facilitate obtaining practical experience.

Record of Experience

The Record of Experience is designed to demonstrate your competence of undertaking oral health education with a number of specified patient groups, covering a range of topics as outlined in the syllabus.

The Record of Experience consists of:

Part A: Log sheets

The care of **ten** individuals, seen on at least two occasions is required and you **must** target at least **six** of the specified patient groups. The setting should normally be within your own place of work but may be elsewhere if appropriate to the particular patient group.

Part B: Expanded Case Studies

Candidates must complete two case studies from the log sheets

- one involving a child
- one involving an adult

Each case study must be approximately 2000 words, covering a topic from the range a - h.

Part C: Display/Exhibition

Candidates must use the set proforma to plan, produce and evaluate a display/exhibition which ideally, but not necessarily, should be in their place of work.

The assessment and internal moderation of the Record of Experience is undertaken by the Training Centre. The final moderation and verification is undertaken by the NEBDN Oral Health Education Committee.

Examination dates and format	The examination, which assesses underpinning knowledge and understanding, takes place on the third Saturday of March and September each year and is held in selected major towns and cities throughout the UK.

Assessment	To ensure that candidates are given every opportunity to pass, individual candidates are assessed on each part of the examination by two members of the Panel of Oral Health Examiners and the results of each individual examination centre are moderated by a Presiding Examiner. The results from all the centres are then verified by the NEBDN Oral Health Education Committee.

INFORMATION FOR CANDIDATES

Results	All candidates receive the results of their examination by post, indicating pass or failure, in early May for the March examination and early November for the September examination.	
	Pass- candidates must be successful in each part of the examination.Merit- awarded for a very good standard throughout the examination.Distinction- awarded for an exceptional performance throughout the examination.	
	Candidates attaining distinction or merit standard will be notified of this at the time of receiving their result.	
	If a candidate passes one part of the examination they will be allowed to carry this over for an 18 month period in order to complete.	
Certification	In order to be awarded the Certificate in Oral Health Education, a candidate must:	
	 complete the Record of Experience to meet the national standard and achieve a pass standard in the written and oral examinations. 	
	Certificates are issued to successful candidates, who are also eligible to apply for an Oral Health Education qualification badge that complements the National Certificate qualification badge.	
Registration for the qualification	Candidates wishing to sit the examination must apply to NEBDN for the documentation relating to the Record of Experience and to reserve a provisional examination place. There is a charge for this documentation and the registration forms are available from NEBDN on request.

OTHER NEBDN QUALIFICATIONS

Post-Registration Qualifications

As well as the Certificate in Oral Health Education, NEBDN offers the following postregistration qualifications for dental nurses who have registered with the General Dental Council and who undertake specific roles requiring further skills and knowledge.

Certificate in Dental Sedation Nursing

This qualification tests the practical skills and theoretical knowledge necessary for the dental nurse assisting in the surgery during routine conscious sedation. The examination is only suitable for candidates engaged in this type of work on a regular basis.

Certificate in Special Care Dental Nursing

This qualification is suitable for dental nurses who assist during the treatment of people whose health and social care needs may require special oral health care provision.

Certificate in Orthodontic Nursing

This qualification is suitable for dental nurses who assist in orthodontic procedures.

Certificate in Dental Radiography

This qualification is suitable for dental nurses who are required to x-ray patients under the direction of a dentist and in accordance with the lonising Radiation (Medical Exposure) Regulations 2000 (IR(ME)R) 2000.
