**Morning & Afternoon Sessions** 

Nick Barker BDS qualified from the Royal London School of Medicine and Dentistry in 1990 with Honours. He accepted the post of House Officer at the Royal London Dental Institute for six months.

Following this, he obtained associate positions in Southend and Colchester before forming a partnership in August 1994 at Bromley Road, Colchester with Hayden Dixon. They jointly took on the Coggeshall practice, Coggeshall Health and Beauty Centre in August 2002.

Nick has an MSc in Restorative dentistry from UCL Eastman and is a supervisor for their Masters programme. He is the Dental Tutor at Colchester Hospital and is the secretary for the Essex BDA branch. Nick also runs one of the extended dental duties for dental nurses courses for Health Education East of England. In his part time, he also runs a referral practice for endodontics and prosthodontics and a specialist clinic for treating hypodontia and complex restorative care alongside an orthodontist and peridontist.

This session will explore some of the more advanced techniques available today for the restoration of damaged teeth.

- Identify and explain the current concepts in adhesive dentistry with specific reference to bonding agents and their use.
- Describe and explain the current concepts in minimally invasive/interceptive dentistry and the relevant materials appropriate in these techniques.

Roddy McMillan is consultant and honorary clinical teaching fellow in oral medicine and facial pain at the Eastman Dental Hospital



Due to the serious consequences to a patient if their medical history is not properly borne in mind, it is vital that General Dental Practitioners have an up to date and broad appreciation of all aspects of medicine that impinge on dentistry.

The increasing age demographic of many dental patients means that complex medical histories and poly-pharmacy are common place. This needs to be carefully considered prior to the provision of dental treatment.

#### Learning outcomes

- Identify medical issues that have the most impact on potential dental treatment
- Take a thorough history to enable an accurate diagnosis in cases of facial pain.

#### **Case Selection:**

The case that is chosen should demonstrate aspects of care, which involve different clinical disciplines. It is not necessary to concentrate on excessively complex or unusual cases, but entrants should choose a case that is appropriate to their skills at this point in their career development. A background of routine treatment, where a specific problem has been highlighted and managed, is what the panel are looking for in the case that is chosen.

Maximum 200 word summary or overview to start. Total length 2000 words. Maximum 6 clinical photographs.

Introduction Presenting Complaint and History of PC Patient Requests / Expectations History (Social, medical and previous dental) Examination (a) Extra Oral;

- (b) Intra Oral -
  - Soft tissues
  - Teeth
  - Periodontal (minimum BPE)
  - Special Tests—Vitality, Radiographs, Diet Sheets, Study Models, Photos, etc.

#### Diagnosis (es) (Provisional and Definitive)

Treatment Plan (Provisional and Definitive) Discussion of Treatment Plan including headings for: Options, Patient Input, Discussion - reasons, philosophy

Treatment Description (short)

Prognosis

**Discussion (and reflection)** 

Conclusion

#### Addenda:

Medical history form, diet sheets, periodontal charts, Lab forms, copies of anonymised clinical notes and radiographs, and most important, the patient consent form.
