TEL Programme update

Helping you to find the information you need online

The TEL team has been continuing to identify and scope a suitable taxonomy for use across healthcare education, particularly for use on our online and digital systems. They recently invited a number of our stakeholders from the taxonomy group to be interviewed by world expert information specialists, Findwise, to identify the requirements across different systems. The team spent two days carrying out interviews and scoping and are now compiling their findings to make a recommendation for an appropriate taxonomy.

learning solutions." Richard Price, project manager in the TEL team, is leading the work on the taxonomy. He said: "The aim is that this work will benefit a number of existing systems including e-LfH, the eLearning Repository and other HEE systems, as well as providing a taxonomy suitable for use with any other new learning solutions."

It is anticipated that a taxonomy management solution and a range of appropriately identified taxonomies will be piloted towards the end of 2016.


(Western University of Health Sciences, Los Angeles, USA), ran a workshop titled: "Stories are medicine; a storySLAM workshop."

A free Values Based Recruitment <u>e-tool</u> challenge for Bands 1-4 has been designed to help people find out whether they are suited to work in the NHS before they apply for the job.

On completion of the 'Values for healthcare' challenge, participants receive their results and feedback by email which they can then download. Employers can also encourage people to complete the assessment tool by adding a link on the jobs section of their website or in communications with candidates.

Values for Healthcare is now available at the <u>NHS Jobs</u> website. Employers advertising a Band 1-4 vacancy on NHS Jobs website now have the option of inviting potential applicants to try *Values for Healthcare* when making their application.

The Values Based Recruitment e-tool has been produced by Health Education England in association with e-Learning for Healthcare.



Updates to oral health promotion e-learning



The oral health promotion session of the Healthy Child Programme (HCP) e-learning resource has been updated with new content and video. The resource is aimed at the Early Years workforce including health visitors, nurses and the child health team working with pregnancy and the first five years of life. The interactive oral health session aims to enhance the knowledge and

skills regarding oral health and the factors that predispose to poor oral health. Promoting oral health in the infant and young child forms an integral part of this session.

The session, entitled 'Dental Health Promotion', was originally developed by the Royal College of Paediatrics and Child Health and e-LfH as part of the HCP. The update to the session was commissioned by Public Health England (PHE) and a working group which included oral health, public health and health professionals who reviewed the current content and updated it to reflect the most recent evidence base: "Delivering better oral health (PHE, 2014)" and provide a public health and preventive focus. A video to support tooth brushing is also available within the e-learning resource which focuses on a health visitor giving key oral health messages and how to establish and maintain tooth brushing to the parents of babies and young children. Widening the access of e-LfH resources

HEE e-LfH has added the e-LfH Hub and its thousands of e-learning sessions to the list of OpenAthens resources to make it easier for certain groups of the health and social care workforce to access e-LfH's e-learning.

<u>OpenAthens</u> is a service that allows people to access a series of online resources free of charge with just a single OpenAthens account.

The OpenAthens <u>eligibility criteria</u>, which are managed by NICE, cover anyone working directly with NHS patients and anyone working directly on the development and/or delivery of training materials for either NHS staff or NHS patients within an organisation that provides NHS-commissioned care or commissions care for NHS patients in England. This includes charities, voluntary organisations, local authorities, arm's length bodies and healthcare students.

Learning Technologies Awards - shortlist

Two HEE e-LfH programmes have been shortlisted for the <u>Learning Technologies</u> <u>Awards</u> (formerly known as the e-Learning Awards).





MindEd has been shortlisted in the 'best learning technologies project' category and the Mental Health

Awareness Programme in the 'excellence in the design of learning content' category.

MindEd is a fantastic programme supporting all adults engaging with children and young people in the UK in preventing the decline in children's mental health.



The Mental Health Awareness
Programme is a collation of several
small projects, focusing on different

disciplines that all deal with mental health every day, aiming to raise awareness of mental health amongst all health care staff.

Reducing childhood obesity

HEE is working in partnership with University of Southampton's public health department to design learning resources aimed at helping professionals to support families with children up to 15 years old to be healthier and prevent obesity. This partnership work will produce two mobile learning resources; one aimed at healthcare professionals and one for families. This collaboration includes partners from Portsmouth Hospitals NHS Trust; Southampton Medical Research Council; University of Bournemouth; Miltoncross Academy; Public Health England with support from behaviour change specialists, a GP and a safeguarding lead.

The project team is keen to involve users in testing the prototypes of the 'professional' learning resource. So, if you work in any of the following roles then we'd love to hear from you: GPs, school nurses, nursery nurses, teachers, health visitors, paediatric nurses, practice nurses, health and wellbeing workers, health trainers, midwives, healthcare students, healthcare workers who are engaged with families, dentists and their wider teams.
