Focus on... Ipswich Hospital

One half of the Suffolk and North Essex NHS Foundation Trust (along with Colchester), Ipswich Hospital serves a population of almost 1 million people. It's a busy (but not too busy!) DGH meeting the demands of its diverse local population. For trainees it provides great opportunities with major urology, general and gynae surgery with a new robot to keep the surgeons entertained and allow to anaesthetists to catch up on admin. There is also elective and emergency spinal surgery. A busy obstetric unit located at the top of a tower block keeps you fit and adds a bit of nuance to an emergency section. Consultants are friendly and supportive as are all the staff in the anaesthetic office.

As a place to live it has lots to offer especially for those who enjoy the great outdoors - Felixstowe is 10 miles away and I am assured it is an easy cycle (!) so you could get there after work. Rushmere Common is across the road from the hospital and Alton Water is nearby. Constable Country is an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty sitting between Ipswich and Colchester and provides beautiful walks, cycle paths and many good pubs! New EoE Virtual Learning Fellows

Hi, I'm Joe and I am an EoE Virtual Learning Fellow for the final-FRCA and post-FRCA regional teaching programmes.

What is involved?

During this fellowship I have become well acquainted with the Bridge learning platform. I have been trying to optimise the Anaesthesia content on there and hopefully it is now appearing in a more sensible format. Alongside this, we have been converting hybrid and virtual teaching days into online learning modules to allow trainees to view these at their leisure (some topics obviously lend themselves to this better than others!) There is lots of admin to improve the notice and information provided for regional teaching days to help streamline the registration process. I've also sent out a survey for all EoE anaesthetic trainees looking at regional teaching specifically and our experience of the Bridge platform to try identify the main areas we can improve.

What are the main findings from the survey?

We will present this formally soon but common themes emerging include things like: inadequate advertising/notice to take leave for events; difficulty finding events on Bridge; difficulty obtaining study leave; transport issues; and variable preferences for face-to-face vs virtual sessions, i.e. 56% would prefer teaching to be predominantly face-to-face and 44% virtual. We have been working to try and address these issues, mainly by obtaining and advertising up-to-date information about teaching events with as much notice as possible. There is still plenty of work to do to improve the regional teaching programme which we will continue to work on.
