- 1. **REPACC:** we have four sites signed up within the region many thanks to those who have got involved we look forward to seeing the results!
- 2. **FLO-DM** (do you like the new title?) FLuid prescribing in peri-Operative patients with Diabetes Mellitus. This is a survey-based project which we are hoping to run in the next month or so (final amendments are happening in the background now). What this project lacks in excitement we hope it will make up for in brevity the survey is 4 questions long and takes 4-5 minutes to complete. Spotlight on... QEHKL by Shrestha Sinha

Located in West Norfolk, historic market town King's Lynn features a DGH with a surprising Anaesthetic Team. The ACSA accredited department features 8 theatres within its main complex and 4 satellite theatres that cover elective, day surgery, trauma, emergency and obstetric work... for the moment at least (the dodgy roof should stop disrupting theatre work soon and, assuming you can trust a politician, we expect a brand new hospital by 2030!) Often punching above its weight, highlights include:



- The Chronic Pain service, also staffed with a friendly and a very well credentialed team with close links to the Faculty of Pain medicine, has been described as a "very well run, small pain service [with] lots of opportunities to learn... a great place to spend half of my advanced paint training."
- Regional Anaesthesia, with a number of skilled consultants, including a previous board member
 of RA-UK, who strive to push forward the development of the Regional Anaesthesia Service, for
 example, recently developing a very successful same-day elective hip and knee replacement
 surgery service.
- The development of many innovations including the Safira injection system, as well as novel inventions across Intensive Care and Airway management, such as the being the first DGH in the UK to use High Flow Nasal Oxygenation as an intubation aid.

This culture of innovative and modern practice has and continues to yield a number of research opportunities particularly within Intensive Care and across Anaesthesia generally, as well as plenty of QIPs (have a chat with Pete Young, Dan Stolady or Alistair Steel when you arrive if your CV needs buffing!). Dedicated Primary Teaching occurs weekly, with plenty of chances to be viva'ed and opportunities for all grades to get involved in teaching.

Full of warm, friendly consultants, nonconsultant career grades, and trainees, a sense of humour pervades the members of this closeknit department (so much so that you'll forget

two of them are Association of Anaesthesia board members). You'll often find the consultants in their respective offices or joining the juniors in the Trainee Room to chat over coffee breaks or lunch. Social events amongst the team often let you forget the fact you're spending all this time in Lynn!

Outside of the town you'll find the beautiful, if not often warm, North Norfolk Coast with a number of RSPB reserves and picturesque coastal towns, the Royal family's Sandringham Estate, and number of charming villages in the surrounding area.

And for those of you dreading the commute, there is now a dedicated Anaesthetic on-call flat, with two rooms exclusively for the use of the Anaesthetic on-call team (in addition to the two on site on-call rooms for night shifts), in case the A10 or A47 at 2100 doesn't appeal to any of you.
