
The Grade 1 View

Political Roundup

On 13th March, Emma, Vish and Kate (60% of your intrepid trainee rep team) joined TPDs Dr Underhill and Dr Pathmanathan in London for a listening event on the shape of postgraduate medical training. This event, run by the postgraduate medical education reform team at NHS England, was designed to hear the voices of and educators residents. consultants on postgraduate medical education should be shaped for the next 10-15 years. Admittedly, the day was slightly derailed by the announcement, some two hours prior to its commencement, that NHS England was being dismantled... But Chris Whitty, Sheona MacLeod and their teams forged ahead with a fantastic afternoon asking for our opinions on how best to improve training in the future.

These consultation events, run throughout the country for different regions, will inform a proposed plan for the future of training. The aim is to present this plan to the government in early July.

Regarding the government's intent to abolish NHS England, it remains to be seen what the effect will be at a regional level. NHS England and Health Education England formally merged in 2023, and therefore much of our School administration comes under the auspices of NHSE. The administrative teams at NHSE are instrumental in supporting recruitment, ARCPs and all of the work done by the clinicians in leading educational roles at a local and regional level. It is not yet clear how (or indeed whether) that administrative support will be amalgamated into the Department of Health and Social Care. What is clear is that it is a time of uncertainty for many as we navigate the future of postgraduate training, the governing bodies of the NHS, and the political climate of the next few years.

EASTRN update

First, a huge thanks to every single one of our collaborators across the EoE who have worked so hard over the last couple of months to help us complete not one but two projects!

FLO-DM: FLuid prescribing in perioperative patients with Diabetes Mellitus - this survey-based project was run at the end of November and we had an amazing 261 responses from across the region! Thanks all for taking the time to fill in a survey on what was, if we are honest, a



very dry topic. We are in the process of writing this up and we are hoping to submit it for publication soon.

NEMOE: Neuromuscular monitoring in the East of England'. The majority of departments within the region participated and with your help we were successful in collecting audit data for nearly 300 cases and nearly 300 anaesthetists responded to our survey. We hope the results will provide meaningful insight and highlight areas and ways we can

improve this important area of our practice.

Why Gibraltar?

A British Overseas Territory, Gibraltar offers a semi-tropical climate, easy



access to Southern Spain & North Africa and direct UK flights (2-hour travel time). The post is based at St. Bernard's Hospital, a busy DGH by the sea, just 5 minutes from town. The hospital boasts stunning views of the bay and North Africa. English is the official language, though Spanish is widely spoken.

The Gibraltar Health Service follows UK NHS guidelines, applies NICE recommendations and is GMC regulated, with visiting teams from Evelina, UCLH, The Marsden and Leicester.



Spotlight On: Luton and Dunstable

Luton and Dunstable hospital is situated in Bedfordshire as part of the Bedfordshire NHS Foundation Trust, along with Bedford hospital, a 25-minute train from central London and next to the beautiful Dunstable Downs. See photo if you've never heard of them...

When cycling from the station to the hospital I can just about glimpse the hills in the distance - at least now that it's light in the morning! There are even lockable bike sheds, showers and lockers! For non-cyclists, the hospital is a stone's throw from the M1.

Now, enough real estate agent description - more on the anaesthetic department.



The anaesthetic department comprises

emergency theatres, obstetric theatres, elective theatres and offices in different areas. We have a shiny, new theatre block nearing completion. Two fantastic college tutors have recently taken up the mantle: Suganya Sabaretnam (who is also an RCOA examiner) and Adam Spong, both of whom go above and beyond in theatres and their free time to help ensure you can achieve your study leave, EDT and rota/module related learning needs.

To that end, the college tutors and a rolling series of resident doctors are championing the revival of Wednesday afternoon teaching and journal clubs. These have become a rare and valued opportunity to connect with anaesthetic peers, trainee reps and the tutors for learning, pastoral support and community building. EDT is pre-set in the rota, and we have attentive Clinical Governance, Research leads and librarians in the education centre who can help use this time effectively. For example, many resident doctors have been involved in EASTRN projects locally using EDT time.

Luton is a specialist airway centre and bariatric centre which means you may find yourself undertaking more fibreoptic intubations than central lines (as was the case for me in the past year). Modules involve multidisciplinary pre-assessment and intra-operative management of bariatric patients who travel from far and wide to engage in treatment. The maternity unit is one of the busiest in the country providing plenty of exposure in and out of hours and opportunities to be involved in improvement projects. A slew of new consultants who trained in EOE recently joined the department and we have a healthy number of locally employed doctors. Several members of the team take an interest in regional anaesthesia and recently organised a hands-on study day.

Out of hours, the local demographics also present interesting trauma and paediatric cases. Fortunately, there is always an SpR or equivalent in ICU, emergency theatres and obstetrics with 2-3 SHOs across emergency theatres and ICU, together with a robust supply of rest spaces. Make sure you bring some food for your on-calls unless you like microwaveable pasties... daytime curry opportunities, however, are plentiful and delicious!
