Keynote Presentation, 09:00 – 10:30

Together – Nurturing a Comfortable Learning Environment

Claire Edwards and Clara Munro

This interactive session will look at how we can promote behaviours within the workplace to render our learning environments safe, friendly and productive. We will review cultural norms and generational differences and talk about sexual safety. We will discuss how to build strong teams. We will examine our own implicit biases and review how we can develop a community of supportive bystanders.

Claire Edwards is Head of the School of Surgery East of England. She has been a Consultant Hand and Trauma surgeon at Norfolk and Norwich University Hospital since 2010.

Claire was elected to the Council of the Royal College of Surgeons of Edinburgh in 2020. She chairs the Professional Standards Committee and co-Chairs the Trainees Committee. She works with several groups concerned with training and workforce development including CSTAC and the Intercollegiate Extended Surgical Team Board. She has a particular interest in the influence of non-technical skills and workplace behaviours on patient safety and medical training. She wrote the RCSEd guidelines on sexual safety.

Claire is an examiner for FRCS (Tr and Orth) and a member of the Faculty of Surgical Trainers RCSEd and the NOTSS International Faculty.

Clara Munro qualified from Newcastle Medical School in 2015 with Merit. She is currently a General Surgical Trainee in the North-East of England having gained membership to the Royal College of Surgeons (Glasgow) in 2019.

Clara is a member of Woman Speaker's in Healthcare and has published work on combating bullying in surgery and leadership. She began working at the BMJ in 2020 as Editorial Registrar after successfully gaining a position as the National Medical Directors Clinical Fellow through the Faculty of Medical Leadership and Management. Clara hosts a podcast for hospital doctors in a joint venture between The BMJ and THIS institute (Cambridge) that aims to educate doctors on non-technical skills needed to work at a more senior level in a hospital environment and is focussed on improving patient safety through education and quality improvement. She is the CORESS Communications Director.

Workshop Slot 1, 10:45 – 12:00

Blended Learning: Practical Aspects of the new Virtual Learning Platform (PG VLE)

In this workshop we will provide a demonstration of the main functions of the new virtual learning platform (PGVLE) and how it will be used for the School of Anaesthesia. This will include how to create and manage bookings for teaching events; how to curate eLearning materials; and more!

Inclusive Beginnings: Engaging Neurodivergent Learners Through Empowering Supervision

Safiya Virji

In this interactive session, you'll explore how to foster inclusive relationships with neurodivergent resident doctors while proactively supporting the success of all your learners. Join me as we redefine the role of supervisors in creating a nurturing environment where every learner feels valued, included, and understood.

Dr **Safiya Virji** is a GP and medical educator. She graduated from Imperial College London with an MBBS and a BSc in Healthcare Management. After qualifying as a GP, she completed an MA in Medical Education and became an accredited Neurodiversity and Inclusivity Trainer.

Alongside her clinical work as a GP, Safiya spent eight years as a GP TPD. She also served a three-year term as Clinical Director for Luton CCG before becoming an Associate Dean for General Practice through her role as NHSE National Health Equity Focused Training Lead. Since 2021 she has been Deputy Head of MBBS Year 3 at Queen Mary University of London, specialising in integrating health equity into the undergraduate curriculum.

Supporting Trainers with a Trainee in Difficulty

This will be a practical workshop aimed at supporting trainers and TPDs who manage trainees who have performance concerns. The workshop will be based on case studies, with plenty of opportunity for interaction, questions, and answers. Then we will focus on practical tips for supporting trainees, from recognising early warning signs through to the management of complex cases and challenging outcomes. Some of the findings from the work undertaken by the Professional Support and Well-Being Service will also be shared and provide a reminder of the services available to support trainees.

Francesca Crawley is a neurologist at West Suffolk Hospital and the clinical lead for the EOE Professional Support and Wellbeing Service (PSW).

ARCPs: What Goes Wrong and How to Get it Right

This workshop looks at the annual reviews of trainees and considers the common pitfalls that affect ARCP panels and trainees, and the challenges in ensuring ARCPs are accurate, fair and supportive. The workshop will consider how ARCPs can be improved to the benefit of training and the experience of trainees. It is appropriate for all those involved in sitting on ARCP panels, providing documentation that an ARCP panel would review and trainees who have ARCPs.

Chris O'Loughlin is a Deputy Postgraduate Dean in NHS England here in the East of England with a variety of responsibilities including Assessment and Revalidation, Trainee processes (like OOP and Study leave), as well as overseeing some of the Specialty Schools. He continues to work two days a week as a Consultant Adult Psychiatrist in Cambridge. Chris was previously Director of Medical Education in CPFT and then Head of School for Psychiatry in the East of England. Feel free to ask about music, learning a new language and triathlon.

Susan Woodroffe is the Education & Training Senior Manager in NHSE (Education) in the East of England with responsibility for the oversight of the ARCP, Appeal and Revalidation process for Resident Doctors. With a variety of roles over the 20+ years working within the "Deanery" she also has oversight of the Professional Support and Wellbeing Team along with the recruitment team as part of her portfolio. Your Opportunity to Shape the Medical Training Review

Bill Irish and Helen Johnson

This is YOUR opportunity to tell us what is good and what is bad about postgraduate medical training - and what you would like to see change. The outputs from this workshop will be fed into the current ongoing national review.

Professor **Bill Irish** studied in Cambridge and London, before training as a general practitioner in Bath and pursuing a parallel career in postgraduate medical education. Previously he was Director of GP Education in Health Education Southwest and chair of COGPED. He leads postgraduate medical education and oversees all educational placements for nursing, midwifery, pharmacy, dental and allied health profession students across the East of England.

Bill is the UK lead postgraduate dean for the specialities of general surgery, trauma and orthopaedic surgery and clinical genetics. He also leads on study leave policy and the MDI scheme for the English Deans.

He holds visiting chairs of medical education at Bristol, East Anglia and Anglia Ruskin universities. He is a fellow at Hughes Hall, Cambridge University and has research interests in high-stakes assessment, medical trainee recruitment and selection.

Bill was fortunate to be deployed as clinical lead for a large Ebola treatment centre in Sierra Leone during the 2015-16 pandemic and has a continued interest in global health working closely with regional, national and international partners.

Dr **Helen Johnson** is the Deputy Dean for the East of England NHSE WT&E, with an overarching remit of a number of postgraduate schools, a multiprofessional portfolio supporting foundation and the Norfolk and Waveney ICB. She is also an enthusiastic lead for the national enhance programme for foundation – built on the future doctor work.

She graduated from St Mary's in London, before training in Obstetrics and Gynaecology in Yorkshire with a special interest in Urogynaecology. She took a consultant post at NWAFT in urogynaecology with obstetrics. Education being a lasting passion, she jointly progressed in educational roles in foundation and O and G, before becoming EoE FSD then Deputy Dean. She has a Masters in Medical Education.

How Learners are Treated in the General Practice: Improving Learners' Experience (GP Only)

If many of our learners are facing discrimination during their training, how might we change this?

Dr Sophie Reshamwalla from the GMC has been meeting with GP trainees in EoE to explore their experiences of racism and will share these findings, along with providing an overview of the GMC's updated 'Good Medical Practice'.

Brendon O'Leary (EoE GP AD) will explain what processes we currently have to support learners, and a framework for how the whole GP community might help improve the experience of our learners for the future.

Sophie Reshamwalla works as a GMC outreach adviser for the East of England. She started her career as a surgical trainee before spending over a decade in the humanitarian field working as a health specialist.

Helping Learners to Understand ICBs

Integrated Care Boards are a fundamental development in the way we work. Although they've been in place for some time and understanding their role is crucial for developing insight into the overall structure and aims of healthcare delivery in England, they can still feel difficult to understand for learners. How can we as a community of healthcare educators help our learners to understand the roles and functions of ICBs, identify opportunities for learning and guide our learners towards experiences which can be beneficial for their development as clinicians and as leaders?

Dr **Frankie Swords**, former Medical Director at Queen Elizabeth Hospital King's Lynn NHS Foundation Trust, is now Medical Director of the NHS Integrated Care Board (ICB) of Norfolk and Waveney's Integrated Care System (ICS). Frankie did her medical training in Oxford, then London and was a consultant physician, specialising in endocrinology, for over 10 years. She has previously held various leadership positions at the Norfolk and Norwich University Hospital, before joining Queen Elizabeth Hospital King's Lynn as Medical Director in September 2019. She also continues to practice and is a Consultant Endocrinologist at Norfolk and Norwich University Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust.

Quality: How We All Play a Role

Nisha Nathwani, Jonathan Rouse and Tracy Wray

This workshop looks at the quality processes that underpin medical education and training and makes them accessible to medical educators on the ground. The interactive workshop will consider how "quality" can be examined, and what it looks like to trainees in our training programmes. The NHSE Quality Team will discuss the processes that are used to monitor and develop our training programmes and there will be real-life examples of how quality-thinking can lead to real change for the experience of our learners both in primary and secondary care.

Dr **Nisha Nathwani** is a Paediatric consultant with special interest in Diabetes and Endocrinology and has been based at the Bedfordshire hospitals for nearly 20 years. She has a keen Interest in Leadership and Medical Education. Nisha currently works within the Quality team as Assistant Director, the SLT as lead DME and with the two deputies at the Bedfordshire hospitals and the cross-site Med Ed teams. She also holds the post of clinical advisor for the National Distribution and Expansion team and Patch Dean for BLMK. Nisha would recommend Medical Education roles to all aspiring leaders!! Her interests include cooking, wine tasting, gardening, and going on long walks with Tom her husband and 3 kids with their lovely rescue dog Chutney - he keeps them all grounded!

Jonathan Rouse is the GP Associate Postgraduate Dean for Quality, Assessment and Workforce in Mid and South Essex. He is also a senior partner in a practice in Southend and an active GP trainer. Over the last couple of years, he helped to streamline approval and reapproval processes for primary care educators and leads on training quality concerns in general practice. He is an active member of the Gold Guide Reference Group that reviews the guidance for all postgraduate medical education. Tracy Wray is the lead for the 'Education Quality' team in the East of England region within the 'Workforce Training and Education Directorate'. The role has provided the opportunity to work across quality and commissioning in the East region and at national level. Prior to this role Tracy worked in senior roles across the health and social care sector in both adults and children's services – she led transformation projects to improve quality of service including patient flow; continuing healthcare; and a redesign of adults and children's services with a focus on quality for both the workforce and patient outcomes. What's All the Fuss About Health Inequalities? Helping Your Trainees Take a Trauma-Informed Compassionate Approach

This session will focus on supporting trainees to integrate learning about health equity throughout their training and professional development by introducing the concepts of health equity, justice, trauma-informed care, "what works" to reduce health inequalities, the role of adverse childhood and community events in engagement and how to enable trainees to survive and thrive working with patients who are easy to exclude from services.

Dr **Jessica Randall-Carrick** works as a GP in a Deep End Practice in Peterborough and Co-ordinates the 'Deep End: East of England Network'.

Jessica is passionate about improving the health & wellbeing of those in the most challenging socio-economic circumstances and seeks to connect with others to collaborate, support and advocate for such individuals & communities. Jessica seeks to mitigate health inequalities through her role as a Clinical Lead with C&P Integrated Care System, particularly focused on CVD prevention (since CVD is the most significant cause of premature morbidity and mortality and health inequalities). She seeks to ensure that systems and processes ensure good quality, equitable, person-centred clinical care. Jessica also seeks to advocate for the most deserving individuals and communities via her role on the Local Medical Committee (LMC) presenting at national conferences, as a GP Trainer and via the network, Deep End: EoE. https://www.deependeastofengland.co.uk/"

Ashley has been supporting this exciting programme since 2022, where she worked as a project officer, before becoming the Enhance Senior Manager is August 2024.

Leadership Next Step Program: Where to Next? Help to Shape the Next Iteration of Senior Leadership Training for Resident Doctors in the East of England

Rowan Burnstein and James Evans

This is your chance to shape the next iteration of senior leadership training for Resident Doctors in the East of England. For each of the last 4 years 70 Resident Doctors have undertaken the Next Step Leadership Program in the East of England. This immersive, 11-month leadership program is funded by the deanery and is open to all Resident Doctors in the two years prior to CCT (primary care, secondary care, dental care). The Program runs over 9 months and comprises a series of face-to-face teaching days, webinars, action learning sets and quality improvement projects aiming to equip Resident Doctors with the tools and confidence to thrive as leaders and managers within the complex environment of the NHS as they complete their specialty training. The session will give a brief overview of the current program and feedback we have received on the program to date. The bulk of the session will be focus on the ongoing needs for Leadership Training of our Resident Doctors and how this might be captured in a leadership program going forward.

Rowan Burnstein completed undergraduate medicine and intern/SHO jobs in Sydney, Australia before relocating to the UK. She trained as an anaesthetist and intensivist in the East of England and took up a post as Consultant in Anaesthesia and Intensive Care, with a subspecialist interest in Neurocritical Care and Major Trauma at Addenbrooke's Hospital, Cambridge in 2002. She has recently retired from clinical work.

Rowan has had a long-standing interest in medical education for both undergraduates and graduates. She continues to be a Fellow, Director of Studies and Tutor at Magdalene College, Cambridge. Previously she has been the Regional Adviser and TPD for Intensive Care Medicine, and Head of School of Anaesthesia.

Rowan is currently a Deputy Dean in the East of England, leading the International Office and Educational Delivery. The latter includes Blended Learning, Simulation, Emerging Educational Technologies, Leadership and Clinical Entrepreneurs. She is the lead UK Postgraduate Dean for Urology and ENT.

Rowan has an enduring interest in global health. She has previously led a partnership in Trauma and Intensive Care in Myanmar, and SCALE Intensive Care in Uganda. She is a member of the Board of Cambridge Global Health Partnerships and continues to work closely with regional, national and international partners.

James Evans is a senior resident doctor specialising in anaesthesia. He graduated medicine from the University of Manchester where he also completed a Master of Research. After core training in North-West England, he spent two years out of program working in New Zealand before returning for specialty training in East of England. He is a currently undertaking the next steps leadership and management program; one of the many facets towards preparing himself for a consultant career.

Fostering a Culture of Belonging: How EDI Shapes Education

EDI Team – Malini Prasad, Lauren Lang, Aditi Modi, Anshoo Dhelaria, Inna Vardi-Flynn and Elizabeth Malaga

Fostering a culture of belonging is essential in education, and creating opportunities for open dialogue and collaboration can truly make a difference in shaping more inclusive environments.

This workshop will discuss the use of interventions like enhanced induction, soft skills courses and reciprocal mentoring which can play a vital role in easing transitions and bridging gaps in cultural understanding.

By offering tailored support and creating spaces for dialogue—like trainee forums—you can help empower both educators and learners to feel heard, respected, and connected.

Some ideas we can explore will be cultural competence in education, shared leadership and peer support; structured feedback mechanisms and celebrating diversity.

Malini Prasad is a Consultant Gynaecologist at the West Suffolk Hospital and the Associate Dean for EDI.

Lauren Lang is an EDI fellow looking at the 'Enhanced Induction' programme. She is an Anaesthetic Registrar.

Aditi Modi is a Consultant Anaesthetist at the West Suffolk Hospital, an MTI supervisor and the 'Differential Attainment' TPD, EDI Team.

This session from Ankit - a GP who created Ankit AI - will explore the practical applications of AI in medical education, highlighting how learners are using it, the challenges and opportunities it presents, and what GP Trainers need to know to stay ahead.

He created Ankit AI, a free tool that has saved over 100,000 hours for GP teams across the UK. Alongside his clinical and representative roles, he is involved in teaching and leads several healthcare-related projects focused on supporting and sustaining general practice.
