
Many practices do not have contracts for orthodontics. However our younger patients need to be monitored during their dental development to assess their needs for orthodontic treatment.



How can we obtain the best result?

In the second of our hands-on endo days you will have the opportunity to discuss your own cases and the challenges you have encountered.

You will be able to further refine your clinical skills with another hands on session.

You need to arrange to visit TWO training practices within the scheme.

You will spend one session ie am or pm in each practice.

You can visit two practices on one day or split your visits over two days. You can only have two sessions out of your own practice.

During the visit you will be expected to

Have a tour of the surgery– this can be given by your host FD or another member of the practice team

Observe your host FD treating a patient and asses them using the Adept. Give them feedback and score the adept on the portfolio.

Have a mock job interview with the ES- You will need to check with the ES that the date and time are convenient for them.

There can be no more than 2 FDs visiting any one practice.

You will need to write up a reflection of c1000 words comparing and contrasting the practices you have visited

- To observe a peer treating a patient
- To perform an Adept on a fellow FD
- To realise the challenges of assessment within the workplace
- To gain interview experience

- To be aware of the differences between dental practices
- To know what sort of working environment you would like to work in after DFT
- To improve your observational, feedback and assessment skills

Employers are required to protect the health and safety of people while at work and others who may be affected by the undertakings. Thousands of accidents and cases of ill health happen in workplaces every year, some are reported to the enforcing authorities, however, many go unreported. A fundamental aspect of health and safety is to take measures aimed at preventing accidents and protecting people. Employers and employees need to work together in order to achieve good health and safety standards. Employers must inform, instruct and train their staff on all aspects relating to safe working practices in order to achieve acceptable standards. Good health and safety standards make good business
